Motion by Weller-Stilson, second by Randolph, to approve the distributed minutes from December 3, 2024, University Academic Council Meeting. Motion was approved unanimously.

Motion by Dickson, second by Love, to consider and approve the revision of the BS in Hospitality Management. Quantella Noto described the justification for the revision of several courses. Course fee approvals will happen separately with the Budget Review Committee. The motion was approved unanimously.

Motion by Bain-Selbo, second by Weller-Stilson, to consider and approve the revision of the BS in Criminal Justice. Brian Donavant described the justification for the revision of the courses required. The motion was approved unanimously.

- b. Program Change: MS in Criminal Justice
 - Course changes

Motion by Bain-Selbo, second by Weller-Stilson, to consider and approve the revision of the MS in Criminal Justice. Brian Donavant described the justification for the revision to courses and revising admission requirements. The degree is reduced to 30 hours from 36 hours. Moving to an 8-week course format, reducing time to degree to 12-18 months. Discussion followed. Motion was approved unanimously.

- c. Program Change: BS in Social Work
 - Course changes

Motion by Bain-Selbo, second by Weller-Stilson, to consider and approve the revision of the BS in Social Work. Brian Donavant described the justification for the revision to the courses required. Reduced the major from 63 to 60 hours. Discussion followed. Motion was approved unanimously.
