Personalized Pathways:

At Southeast, we offer online courses in a traditional 16-week fall and spring semester with eight-week sessions in the first and last half of both. In addition, we offer a wintersession between fall and spring and at least six different 4-, 6-, and 8-week sessions over summer. (Nursing specific (NS) courses are only offered in the fall and spring semester.) Talk with an advisor to see how you can utilize these different sessions to expedite your degree completion.

Newly admitted students should contact the online advising office, onlineadvising1@semo.edu, for detailed information and for assistance in arranging a plan of study.

Degree requirements for all students: a minimum of 120 credit hours; completion of/transfer credit for General Education program courses; residency at Southeast - at least 30 hours from Southeast; 39 senior division hours required: current residency at Southeast - 12 of your final 18 hours must be taken with Southeast; grade point average at Southeast: 2.0 minimum required; grade point average cumulative: 2.0 minimum required. Refer to the Undergraduate Bulletin or Degree Works for additional graduation requirements.

RN-BSN Students. Registered nurses who graduated from an associate degree or diploma nursing program may apply to the RN-BSN Online Program. All degree requirements including both nursing and non-nursing courses are offered online. Nursing courses that require a field experience may be completed in the students' geographical location where they hold an RN license and have an approved RN preceptor. Guidance is given by the course instructor by communicating online with the RN student and preceptor. Qualified students who are licensed RNs and hold a GPA of 2.50 or better and have completed a criminal background check are admitted every fall and spring semester until the class is full. Once RN-BSN students are enrolled in their final semester of the program, an additional 37 hours of baccalaureate nursing credit will be added to their transcripts. Both nursing and non-nursing courses completed at a prior college or university are included in the total number of credits earned.
