

Bachelor of Arts (BA)**Social Science**

The purpose of the Bachelor of Arts in Social Science is to develop interdisciplinary professional skills and academic preparation in the social sciences. This degree allows students the flexibility to choose one major concentration area and one secondary concentration area from each of the following disciplines: anthropology, criminal justice, economics, history, political science, psychology, and sociology.

It is well suited for students interested in professional opportunities in research, analysis, human resources, and other social science fields, as well as careers in military service and law enforcement.

Social science students will...

- Choose an area of emphasis from six areas of concentration to match their interests and career goals.
- Identify a secondary area of interest to support additional competencies.
- Develop skills in understanding and using data.
- Understand the relevance of social science methods to related professions.

Career Planning

Career preparation is part of the mission of Southeast. In fact, more than 90% of Southeast students participate in internships, clinical opportunities, student teaching, research assistantships, and study abroad.

Degree requirements for all students: a minimum of 120 credit hours, completion of University Studies program, career proficiencies (CL001-004), Writing Proficiency Exam (WP003), and completion of the Measure of Academic Proficiency and Progress (MAPP) at the senior level.

A minimum 2.0 GPA in the major and overall are required to graduate with a B.A. with a major in social science.
