# Anthropology Option

The anthropology option within the global cultures and languages major trains its students in the holistic study of humanity, both past and present. The program focuses on anthropological method, theory and practice with a focus on the interaction between human culture, biology and environment.

We provide training in all subfields of the discipline: sociocultural anthropology, linguistic anthropology, archaeology and biological anthropology. The academic interests of our students range from prehistoric North American archaeology to forensic anthropology and from linguistics to the anthropology of religion. The curriculum is designed to prepare students for graduate study or entry-level positions in the field.

- Interact with qualified faculty in a small class environment.
- Have opportunities for low-cost study-abroad programs.
- Interact with native speaker exchange students.
- Be prepared for graduate studies and entry-level positions in business and industry, government, and non-profit organizations.

### Career Planning

Career preparation is part of the mission of Southeast. In fact, more than 90% of Southeast students participate in internships, clinical opportunities, student teaching, research assistantships, and study abroad. Currently, the majority of Global Cultures & Languages graduates find employment within one year of graduation.

Professional career counselors are available for all students. The Office of Career Services in Academic Hall 057 can provide students with professional career counseling, resume critiques, practice interviews, job search strategies, career events, networking opportunities, and more.
