Evaluation of Learning:

Quizzes:

There will be assigned quizzes that are assigned on Moodle throughout the duration of the course. Students are responsible for keeping up with the assigned readings and understanding the materials presented in each chapter. These quizzes will cover material presented in the textbook, the lecture notes available online as well as assigned readings. Exams:

There will be two exams that will take place over the period of the course, a midterm and a final exam. Retention of knowledge is important as you matriculate through this program and course, so each test may have questions that build off material that is presented earlier in the course. The final exam will be comprehensive in nature but will also cover material in the fourth unit.

Assignments:
